REVOLUTIONARY WAR SOLDIERS WHO LIVED IN RUTHERFORD COUNTY

- 1. William <u>Arnold</u> b. Aug 31, 1749 in Cumberland Co., VA and of Rutherford Co. had his application for Revolutionary War pension rejected under the Act of 1832, because he had not served at least 6 months. In his application dated Nov 17, 1834, he stated he served in the VA line. He was living in Henry Co., VA at enlistment, then moved to Surry Co., NC, then to "TN on the Holston River" for 2 years, to Knox Co., TN 4-5 years, to Rutherford Co. for 5 years, Lincoln Co., TN for 6-7 years, Jackson Co., AL for 2 years, then back to Rutherford Co. He was on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co.
- 2. George <u>Askins/Haskins</u>, b. ca 1754 d. Mar 1832 in Maury Co., TN. He applied for pension in Rutherford Co. June 6, 1818 for service in the Revolutionary War in the 6th SC Troops. In 1810 & 1820 he was 66 years old. He m. Sep 28, 1815 in Rutherford Co., TN, Mary "Polly" <u>Williams</u>. She applied for widow's benefits June 8, 1857 in Davidson Co., TN, aged 74. [RWP]. He owned 100 acres in the 1809 & 1811 Rutherford Co. tax lists, and on the 1810 & 1820 census.
- 3. Amos Balch b. July 20, 1758 Baltimore Co., MD d. ca. 1835, buried Thompson Cemetery, Bedford Co., TN, son of James Balch and Ann Goodwin. He m. 1784, Ann Patton, b. Dec 1, 1760 in Mecklenburg Co., NC - d. Apr 4, 1824, Bedford Co., TN, daughter of Samuel and Anna Patton, Sr. of Mecklenburg Co., NC. The family moved to Rockey River Settlement in Mecklenburg Co., NC, then to East TN, then to Christian Co., KY and finally to Middle TN in 1807. He applied for a pension Aug 11, 1832 in Bedford Co., TN stating he enlisted in Mecklenburg Co., NC and served in the Revolutionary War on the NC line even though exempted for service "in consequence of being blind in one eye." Amos Balch and others purchased 5,000 acres on the south side of the Duck River on both sides of Sugar Creek from the State of NC 10 July 1798 [DB D, p. 337]. CHILDREN: Ann Balch, (b. Nov 22, 1785); Barbara Balch, (b. Feb 6, 1788, m. Joseph Alexander); Rhoda Balch, (b. Oct 28, 1790 - d. 1859, m. July 5, 1811, in Bedford Co., James W. Patton); Peggy Balch, (b. Mar 20, 1793 - d. 1830); John Bloomer <u>Balch</u>, (b. July 19, 1795 - d. Apr 24, 1863(?) near Sardis, MS, m. Jan 1817, Sarah Cook, b. 1801 – 1852); Alfred Moore Balch, (b. Jan 23, 1798 in Logan Co., KY); Samuel Patton Balch, (b. Sep. 7, 1800 Logan Co., KY - d. 1871 Tippah Co., MS, m. 1829 Patricia Hannah Yates, b. ca. 1801 - d. 1880 in MS); James Calvin Balch, (b. Apr 19, 1803 Logan Co., KY - d. 1857, Sparta, TN, m. 1st Jan 10, 1829, Eliza Jane Hazlett, b. Nov 1803 - d. 1840, m. 2nd Aug 26, 1841, Anna Elizabeth Cosby, b. Giles Co., TN.).
- 4. John Barkley/Barclay/Bearkley, Sen., b. 1763 in Rowan Co., NC d. July 3, 1850 in Warren Co., TN. He applied for a pension Apr 10, 1833 in Rutherford Co., stating his age was 71, and that he had enlisted in Rowan Co., NC for service on the NC line in the Revolutionary War. [RWP]. He was first listed in the Rutherford Co. 1810 census and the 1809 & 1811 tax lists. He was listed on the 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 77. John Barkley/Barklay and Andy Barkley sold 81 acres (deed mentions Knox's Spring) to Dennis Hogwood on Feb 21, 1842 [DB Z, p. 496]. John Barkley's will is at the Rutherford Co. Archives. He names his wife, Jane (Rowan Co., NC marriage records:

- John <u>Barkley</u> m. 3 Nov 1785, Jane/Jean <u>Knox</u>) and names several grandchildren. CHILDREN: William <u>Barkley</u>; Andrew <u>Barkley</u>; James <u>Barkley</u>; John <u>Barkley</u>, Jr. (deceased, m. Elizabeth ?).; Sarah <u>Barkley</u>; Mary <u>Barkley</u>.
- 5. David Dubart <u>Barton, Sen.</u>, b. in Frederick Co.,Md. 15 Mar 1744 d. 15 July 1815 in Rutherford Co., m. June 2, 1771, Hannah <u>Hill</u>, b. 1754. He was appointed overseer of the road from Simon <u>Miller's</u> to Cripple Creek, Apr 6, 1807 [RCM B, p. 6]. He was first listed on the Rutherford Co. 1810 census and owned 150 acres on the 1809 tax list and 520 acres on the 1811 tax list. He was listed as a lieutenant and fought in the Revolutionary War [see DAR records]. He wrote his will July 12, 1815, probated 30 July 1815, naming his wife, Hannah, and CHILDREN: Joshua <u>Barton</u> (b. 1772, an executor); Violet <u>Barton</u> (b 1775 m. Robert <u>Jones</u>); Sarah <u>Barton</u> (b. 1779); Swinfield <u>Barton</u> (b. 1781, an executor); Robert <u>Barton</u> (b. 1794-5); and "money due me from the estate of Daniel Bird <u>Smith.</u>" Other CHILDREN not mentioned in the Will may have been: Joannah <u>Barton</u> (b. 1774, m. Jonathan <u>Hall</u>); Isaac <u>Barton</u> (b. 1777); Jesse <u>Barton</u> (b. 1783); Thomas <u>Barton</u> (b. 1785); David <u>Barton</u>. (b. 1787); William Barton (b. 1792).
- 6. James A. Bass, Sen., b. ca 1755 in Dinwiddie Co., VA d. Feb/Mar 1826 in Rutherford Co. A government marker for service as private in VA Militia during the Revolutionary War has been placed. [Bass Cemetery, Blackman area] (NBNW 3 Mar 1826). He was first listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809, owning 1,200 acres, and on the 1811 tax list he owned 600 acres. He was on the 1810 & 1820 census of Rutherford Co. He m. Temperance Jordan and in 1807 they built their home which presently is located at 2537 Blackman Road. The log part of the house was built without a dog trot or central hallway even though it was 2-story. The front of the house was built later and is of frame construction. It is said that this is the oldest frame house built in Rutherford Co. [APTA]. He wrote his will dated 24 Nov 1825 [recorded April 1826] naming his wife, Temperance Bass and CHILDREN: Thomas Bass [b. 1785]; Benjamin Jordan Bass [b. 1788]; James Bass, Jr. [b. 1798]; Hartwell Bass [b. ca 1804, d. ca 1827, m. Sarah Richardson]; Temperance W. Bass [b. ca 1794 m. 1st 1810, Thomas B. Smith, and m. 2nd 1825, Benjamin Rucker]; Nancy Bass [b. 1791, m. Peyton Randolph Smith]; Mary Clark Bass [b. ca 1801, m. 1816, Samuel Hervey Laughlin]. A division of James Bass's land of 537 acres into 7 equal shares was made Jan 1827 (the land was located near Anthony's Mill) [DB R, p. 435]. Temperance Bass b. 1770-80 was listed head of the household on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co.
- 7. James <u>Batey/Beaty/Beatty</u>, b. Feb 25, 1755 Nottingham Township, Chester Co. PA d. ca Mar-Aug 1835 in Rutherford Co., made application for pension in Rutherford Co. Aug 20, 1832 aged 78 years, 5 months, 26 days for service in NC line of Revolutionary War. He lived in Rowan Co., NC at the time of his enlistment. He stated he had a twin sister. [RWP]. He was on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. His original will exists dated Mar 15, 1835 and probated Aug 1835 [Rutherford Co. Archives]. His wife, Mary, was executrix and sole heir.
- 8. Capt. William <u>Batey/Bettey/Beaty, Jr.,</u> (The name "Capt." may be honorary. Also known as William <u>Beaty, Sen.</u>) b. in Va. 1 May 1760 d. Jan 11, 1835, a Revolutionary War Soldier with service in the militia from Brunswick Co., VA, son of Thomas <u>Bettey</u> and Martha "Patsey" <u>Thrower.</u> [DAR records]. He m. 1st Mary <u>Betty;</u> m. 2nd 1796 in Brunswick Co., Va, Ann <u>Bass</u>, b. Aug 23, 1773 d. Aug 3, 1851. [DAR records]. William first appeared on Rutherford Co. records 31 Oct 1808 when he purchased 175 acres of land from Charles <u>McCord</u>. [DB F, p. 630]. William <u>Batie</u> was appointed as juror for the Rutherford Co. Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions, 10 Oct 1812. He was on the 1811 Rutherford Co. tax list, owning 505 acres, and listed on the 1820 & 1830 census of Rutherford Co.

CHILDREN: Christopher <u>Batey</u> (b. 1792); Sallie H. <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [b. 1798, m. 1817, Burrell <u>Gannaway</u>]; Louisa <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [m. Leonard "Len" H. <u>Sims</u>]; Nancy <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [m. 1828, Robert C. <u>Howse</u>]; Benjamin <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [b. 1801, m. Euline <u>Morton</u> and Tabitha <u>Jetton</u>]; Elizabeth <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [b. 1803, m. 1819, Henry D. <u>Jamison</u>]; Martha <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [b. 1805, m. 1821, James Moore <u>King</u>]; George Washington <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, [b. 1815, m. 1836, Mary Jane <u>Crockett</u>]; William <u>Batey/Beaty</u>, III, [b. 1817, m. America Crockett]. [Batey Cemetery, off Franklin Road]

9. Robert Bean/Beene, Sen. b. May 3, 1764 in Pittsylvania Co., VA d. Nov 17, 1824 Marion Co., TN, son of John Been and Elizabeth Henderson. He m. (age 16) 1780 at Ft. Watauga Settlement, Martha Womack, b. Mar 20, 1758 - d. bet 1840-50 in Alabama. (She was 23 years old when she married). Her parents are believed to be Jacob and Mary Womack. At age 15 he served in the Revolutionary War under Col. Elijah Clark of the GA line. He served as a Watauga rifleman and volunteer service at the Battle of King's Mountain. He signed the petition requesting the formation of Rutherford Co. 10 Aug 1803. He was appointed overseer of a road from John Price's to Cripple Creek, Oct 8, 1805 [RCM - A, p. 105]. CHILDREN: Lemuel Bean (b. Feb 5, 1782, m. Sally Bean); Rhoda Bean (b. Nov 2, 1783, m. John Owens); Obediah Bean, (b. Dec 15, 1785, m. Barbara Heifner); John or Jack Bean (b. Jan 1, 1788, m. Sarah ?); Elizabeth Bean (b. Dec 10, 1789, m. John Patton); William Bean (Dec 12, 1791, m. ?Miss Williams); Robert Bean, Jr. (July 10, 1794, m. Sarah Wynne); Sarah Bean (b. Nov 1798, m. Benjamin Selman); Jesse Bean (b. Nov 29, 1800, m. (1) Naomi Pyburn; m. (2) Nancy Wynn); Martha Bean (b. July 6, 1803, m. Levi Womack). [see Bean family genealogy

10. John Beavert, b. 1743 - d. after 1818, drew pension in Rutherford Co., 1818 list, age 75, for service in NC line of Revolutionary War.

of Rutherford Co. with a male b. before 1766 and a male b. 1766-1784, and a male b. 1770-80 on the 1820 & 1830 census of Rutherford Co. He purchased property from Batey Armstrong 30 Oct 1806. He was on the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809 and 1811, owning 1,200 acres. In the Roster of Revolutionary War soldiers from NC: "Sat. Sep 9, 1775 - appointment of Field Officers of Minute Men - Craven Co., NC... Frederick Becton, 2nd Major." His son was Dr. Frederick Edward Becton, Jr., (b. Oct 7, 1801 in Craven Co., NC) Rutherford Co. marriage records show that Frederick E. Becton m. 1st 10 Aug 1823, Catharine Harris; and, 2nd m. 18 Jan 1824, Eliza P. Yandell, daughter of Dr. Wilson Yandell of Rutherford Co.). Dr. Becton studied medicine under Dr. Wilson Yandell and received a medical degree from Transylvania University in 1823. He practiced a few years in Mississippi, then returned to Murfreesboro where he remained until his death 30 July 1838.

12. Thomas Bedford, Jr. b. in Goochland Co., VA ca 1754-1758 - d. Apr 24, 1804 ["The TN Gazette & Mero Dist. Advertiser", Apr 25, 1804, Vol 4, No. 23 states "Thomas Bedford died suddenly yesterday at his home in Rutherford Co."], son of Thomas Bedford, Sen., m. 27 Dec 1780 in Chesterfield Co., VA, Ann Robertson, [b. before 1766, she was listed head of a household in the 1810 & 1820 census of Rutherford Co.] daughter of John and Sarah Robertson. Mrs. Ann Bedford, b. 1757 - d. Oct 1828 in Nashville, "of Rutherford Co." He served in 4th Regt. of the Continental VA line and 1st Lt. in the Henry (Co.?) Militia when he made Oath June 1780 during the Revolutionary War. He and Robert Weakley obtained 3,840 acres of land December 12, 1801 within which was located the Town of Jefferson. He signed the petition requesting the formation of Rutherford Co. 10 Aug 1803. A new county formed south of Rutherford Co. in 1807 was named for him. Thomas Bedford, Jr. settled near Old Jefferson. [NBNW 11 Oct 1828]. CHILDREN: John R. Bedford; Mary Coleman Bedford (m. 1804, Capt. Robert Bedford), Thomas Bedford III, William H.

<u>Bedford</u>, George <u>Bedford</u>, Nancy <u>Bedford</u>, Benjamin <u>Bedford</u>, Littleberry Bedford.

13. Obediah M. Benge b. 1763 in Albemarle Co., VA - d. Mar 23, 1846 in DeKalb Co., AL. He m. "before 1800 in Franklin Co., TN", Sarah ?. He applied for pension Feb 22, 1843 in DeKalb Co., AL, age 79, for service on the NC line in the Revolutionary War. He stated he was forced into service by his step-father, John Fielder, as a substitute for James Green in Surry Co., NC. About 1791-92 he moved to Davidson Co., TN for 8 years and then to what became Franklin Co., TN. In 1814 he moved to Walker Co., GA and lived among the Cherokees until they were sent west. His widow applied for benefits July 21, 1852 in DeKalb Co., AL. [RWP]. Obediah M. Benge signed the petition requesting the formation of Rutherford Co. 10 Aug 1803. He purchased items at the estate sale of John Cummins Oct 26, 1804. He was appointed overseer on a road from John Cummins (Cummings's) Mill, to William Edwards, Jan 8, 1805 [RCM -A, p. 50]. He was appointed commissioner 10 July 1806. He was listed as sheriff 6 Apr 1807. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. 1810 census and owned 222 acres on the 1809 tax list and 236 acres on the 1811 tax list. O. M. Burge appeared on a list of letters remaining at the Jefferson Post Office Jan 1, 1810.. CHILDREN: Patsey Benge (b. Sep 22, 1786); Elesabeth Benge (b. June 30, 1788); W. B. Benge (b. Mar 22, 1790); George C. Benge (b. Feb 2, 1802); Robert Benge (b. June 1803). [RWP]. One source states that William Bean was the father of Obediah Benge. William was said to have m. a Cherokee woman and those children were in Rutherford Co. and changed their name to Benge.

14. Joseph <u>Bennett</u> b. ca 1757 in Mecklenburg Co., VA - d. after 1840. He applied for pension May 18, 1833 in Mecklenburg Co., VA for service as Pvt. in the 11th Regt. of VA Continental Troops during the Revolutionary War, stating his age was 76. He enlisted in Mecklenburg Co., VA where he had always lived, except for a few years in Granville Co., NC. In 1838 he moved to Rutherford Co. "to be near his children." He appeared on 1840 Rutherford Co. census as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 83.

15. Francis <u>Berry</u> b. 1762 in Augusta Co., VA - d. after June 1852 in TX. He applied for pension June 11, 1852 in Caldwell Co., TX for service on the VA line of the Revolutionary War. He stated he was raised in Washington Co., VA and lived there until he was 30 years old when he moved to TN. Then he moved to IL. In 1823 he moved to TX. Francis <u>Berry</u> was Capt. of Frederick, VA Militia Aug 4, 1779. [RWP]. A jury of view was required to view and mark out a road from <u>Ready</u>'s Mill to Francis <u>Berry</u> on the Barren Fork of Duck River, 1807 [RCM - B-56].

16. Samuel Blair, b. ca 1762 - d. after 1836. He applied for a pension Aug 1, 1836 in Davidson Co., TN, age 74, for service on the NC line in the Revolutionary War. He stated he was living in Guilford Co., NC when he enlisted at age 17. He mentions a sister, Peggy, wife of John Blair. [RWP]. As "a private in the battalion of troops raised for the protection of Davidson Co.", he was granted 400 acres on Stones River, May 5, 1802, NC Grant No. 179 [see RCHS Pub. Land Grants]. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809, and received a Rutherford Co. Militia Commission with rank of Ensign on Nov 10, 1809. He was in the Buchanan's Fort during the Indian attack Sep 30, 1792.

17. Col. Ezekiel Alfred Blanch, b. in Bute Co., N.C. 10 June 1757 – d. 1832 in Brunswick Co., VA. According to DAR records he served in the Revolutionary War as a Private in the Brunswick Troops . He m. 1st 1784, Nancy Taylor and m. 2nd 10 Dec 1801, Mildred Cook. CHILDREN of first marriage: Samuel K. Blanch (b. 1785, m. Rebecca Gordon); John Blanch (b. 1789); Polly Blanch (b. 1790, m. William Walthrop); Sallie W. Blanch (b. 1793, m. John Manning); George White Thomas Blanch (b. Nov 16, 1795, m. Nancy Bailey Dugger). CHILDREN of second marriage: Nancy Blanch

(b. 1803); Lucy K. <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1805, m. John Easter <u>Dromgoole</u>); James B. <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1807); Rebecca Mildred <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1808, m. John Easter <u>Dromgoole</u>); Margaret <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1810, m. John <u>Jordan</u>); William H. <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1812, m. Mary C. <u>Rogers</u>); Alfred E. <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1814, m. Emily <u>Felts</u>); Caroline M. <u>Blanch</u> (b. 1816, m. Amos <u>Jones</u>).

18. Thomas <u>Blanton</u>, b. 1752-60 - d. May 27, 1846 in Rutherford Co. He applied for a pension Apr 30, 1823 in Rutherford Co. for service in VA Revolutionary troops under General Greene and fought in the Battles of Guilford Court House, Camden, Eutaw Springs, and several others. He stated his age was 63 in 1823. He is listed in "Virginians in the Revolution." On June 5, 1847, his widow Drucilla/Scilly <u>Anglea</u>, stated she was 81 years old and m. Thomas <u>Blanton</u> on Oct 28, 1783 in Cumberland Co., VA. He was on the 1820 census, and on the 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Rev. War pensioner, age 78. [Blanton Cemetery, Manson Pike] [RWP]

19. Capt. Reading <u>Blount</u> b. Feb 22, 1757 in NC - d. Oct 13, 1807, m. 1777 in NC, Lucy <u>Harvey</u>. He is said to have served as a Major on the NC line during the Revolutionary War. "His pension papers were burned in a fire in 1800." [RWP]. He owned 4,800 acres, which had been granted between the east & west forks of Stones River to Reading <u>Blount</u>, Major, Apr 22, 1788, NC Grant No. 14 [see RCHS Pub. Land Grants]. A division of his estate was made July 1817 involving 5,045 acre tract of land [DB M, p. 31]. CHILDREN: Louisa <u>Blount</u>; Carolina <u>Blount</u>; Mary <u>Blount</u> (m. John <u>Myers</u>); Reading <u>Blount</u>, Jr.; Wylie <u>Blount</u>. DB N, p.49, July term 1817, states that Reading <u>Blount</u> is dead and his heirs are: John <u>Myers</u>; Joseph W. <u>Worthington</u> [?<u>Washington</u>] & wife, Louise; Caroline <u>Blount</u> (m. ? Jones); Willie A. Blount; John G. R. T. Blount.

20. Daniel T. <u>Boatright, Sen.</u>, bought land from Samuel <u>Lang</u> 29 Mar 1805. Daniel <u>Boatright</u> served as a Pvt. in the 2nd GA Battn. during the Revolutionary War. He was in Rutherford Co. when he purchased items at the estate sale of John <u>Miller</u>, Oct 23, 1806. He was b. before 1766 on the 1810 & 1820 census of Rutherford Co., and on the 1811 tax list.

21. James <u>Bole</u> b. May 19, 1749 in East Cain, Chester Co., PA. On Aug 30, 1832 in Rutherford Co. he requested a pension for service in the Revolutionary War, stating that he was 83 years, 3 months, and 11 days old. He participated in the Battle of Princeton, etc. In 1780 he moved to Lancaster Co., PA until 1785 when he moved to Chester Co., SC where he resided for 11 years and then moved to Pendleton District, SC and resided until Nov 3, 1807 when he moved to Rutherford Co. [DAR records]. He received a Rutherford Co. Militia Commission with rank of Lieut. on July 24, 1813. A jury of view was required to view and mark a road from Bedford County road to Black Fox's Camp through the plantation of James <u>Bole</u>, 1811 [RCM - E-179, 213]. [RCHS Pub # 13, p. 72-76].

22. James <u>Bolen</u>, b. ca 1747 - d. after 1832, drew pension on 1832 Rutherford Co. list, age 85, for service in PA Revolutionary line. He may be the same person as James <u>Bole</u> (above).

23. George Conway Boothe, Sen., b. Oct 6, 1758 in NC - d. Aug 3, 1844, and his 3rd wife, Anna Nelms b. Feb 6, 1756 - d. Mar 29, 1822 (White Cemetery, was in LaVergne, moved by Corps of Eng.). He was listed in the Rutherford Co. 1810 census and 1809 & 1811 tax lists. He applied for a Rev. War pension Oct 2, 1832 in Rutherford Co., stating his age was "near 74" and that he had enlisted in Northumberland Co., VA with service as Private in the 9th VA Regt. He appeared on 1840 Rutherford Co. census as a pensioner, age 82. [RWP]. He wrote his will 2 Mar 1843, probated Aug 1844. Executor: Levi White. CHILDREN: Sally Olden Boothe (b. Jan 25, 1792, m. 1st Levi White, d. 1848; m. 2nd Henry Norman); Polly Boothe (b. May 15, 1793); George Conway Boothe, Jr. (b. Apr 18, 1795); Samuel Boothe (b. Nov 9, 1797); Sumner Boothe (b. Oct 30, 1799, "insane" living with his sister, Sarah, on 1850 Rutherford Co. census); John Boothe (b. Oct 26, 1801). [DAR records].

24. Capt. James <u>Bosley</u> had a plantation on the stone lick about 2 miles from Nashville ca June 6, 1796 [RCHS Pub. <u>Land Grants</u>]. He was from MD and m. Dec 12, 1783, Rebecca <u>Maclin</u>, daughter of William <u>Maclin</u> and Sarah <u>Clack</u>. She died in 1787 without issue (had been pregnant with child May 15, 1786). James <u>Bosley</u> was on the 1787 tax roll for Davidson Co. James <u>Bosley</u> accused of breaking the Sabbath by Grinding at his Horse Mill [Grand Jury presentiments, Jan 4, 1787, Davidson Co. Minutes]. "The old Revolutionary soldier, Captain James Bosley . . . died in 1823 at the ripe old age of one hundred and four years."

25. Daniel Bowman, Sen., b. May 15, 1759 in Frederick Co., MD - d. 6 Dec 1843 Rutherford Co., son of John and Catharine Bowman, m. 1784 Susannah Margaret Horn, b. ca 1765 - d. between 1845-1846 Rutherford Co. After 1776, Daniel and his parents and some grown siblings were found in the newly created Washington Co, Md. (they never moved, just county lines). This family attended German speaking Churches in the late 1700s. Daniel's parents were in western Maryland by 1740, both parents died by 1807. This was about the time Daniel left Maryland (last of his siblings to leave). It was said that Daniel not only could read/write but spoke 2-3 languages (German, English and ?). He was certainly active at the Rutherford Co. courthouse, his name and signature appearing very often in various capacities 1808 to ca 1840, as Juror, Justice of Peace, Commissioner. He applied for a pension Oct 1, 1832 in Rutherford Co., stating his age was 73, and had served on the VA line in the Revolutionary War. [RWP]. He owned 737 acres on the 1809 & 1811 tax lists, and was listed on the 1810, 1820 & 1830 census of Rutherford Co., and was listed on the 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 82. His son: Benjamin Ellis Bowman, Sr., b. Washington Co., MD Feb 6, 1804 - d. ca 1889 Rutherford Co., m. July 13, 1830, Jane M. Brown, b. in SC ca 1803 - d. ca 1880-1889, Rutherford Co. [info from Joyce Terrana, Burleson, TX]. His original will exists at the Rutherford Co. Archives dated Oct 12, 1842, probated 1 Jan 1844 [RCM Z, p. 398-9]. His daughter, Susan Bowman m. 13 May 1817, Dandridge Acree.

26. Samuel Bowman, Sen., b. ca 1760 in Bucks Co., PA - d. ca Mar 1838. His original will exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives dated 13 Feb 1838, probated Mar 1838. On Aug 23, 1832 he applied for pension in Rutherford Co, stating his age 72, for service in VA Revolutionary line. He enlisted in Mecklenburg Co., VA, where he lived for some time after the War, then moved to Rutherford Co. [RWP]. He owned 750 acres on the 1811 tax list and was listed on the 1810 and 1830 census for Rutherford Co. A bridge was authorized to be built across the Stones River at Maj. Samuel Bowman's Mill, 1833 [RCM - X-484]. CHILDREN listed in will: Eleanor Bowman (first wife of David Robertson); William Bowman; Elizabeth Bowman (wife of John Clark); Nancy Bowman (present wife of David Robertson); John Bowman; Margaret Bowman(widow of William Lock); Samuel Bowman, Jr.; Adaline Bowman (wife of James Elliott); Viola A. Bowman (d. before 1837, m. 1825, Thomas Batts; who later m. 1837, her sister, Elmyra); Malissa Bowman (deceased, first wife of Silas Tucker); Elmyra Bowman (present wife of Silas Tucker, she later m. Thomas Batts).

27. John <u>Bradley</u>, b. in VA 1756 - d. 1853, "Major in the VA line of Revolutionary War" (OCC) m. Mollie <u>Vance</u>. He applied for a pension for Revolutionary War service Oct 9, 1832 in Rutherford Co., stating his age 76. His service records state he served as Pvt. and Sgt. in the 3rd, 7th and 11th Regt. of the VA Continental Line in Capt. John Robert's Co. He stated he was living in Culpeper Co., VA when he enlisted in 1777-1778 and was discharged 1781. [RWP]. John <u>Bradley</u> was appointed a commissioner 10 July 1807. John <u>Bradley</u> was overseer on the Wagon ford on W. Fork of Stones River to John <u>Sullins</u>'s Creek, July 6, 1806 [RCM A, p. 187]. John <u>Bradley</u> donated the acreage where <u>Bradley Academy</u> was located [Pittard, p. 46].He was on a list of letters remaining at the Jefferson Post Office Jan

1, 1810. He owned 150 acres on the 1811 tax list, and was listed on the 1810,1820 & 1830 census of Rutherford Co. He appeared on the 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 84. His daughter, Sara Bradley b. 1780 - d. 1855, m. Matthew McClanahan. John Bradly b. 1755 in VA and Hetty Bradly, b. 1798 in VA and John Bradly b. 1795 in TN were living in the Flemings Dist. (21st) on the 1850 Rutherford Co. census. John Bradley d. before May 1853. He left 5 children: Mary Bradley (m. 1829 Jackson Wallace); John Bradley; Hetty Bradley; Sarah "Sallie" Bradley (m. 1801 in Blount Co., Matt McClanahan); Elizabeth/Esobel Bradley (m. 1822, Samuel Smith).

28. George <u>Brandon, Jr.</u>, father of George <u>Brandon, III</u>, served as a wagon master in the Revolutionary War and lost a leg coming home, from a wagon accident. George, Jr. was b. in PA or NC ca. 1745 – d. about 1832 in Rutherford Co. He signed the petition requesting the formation of Rutherford Co. 10 Aug 1803. He was on the first panel called for Jury duty on July 2, 1804 of the newly formed Rutherford Co. [Spence, p. 37]. George <u>Brandon</u> was overseer on the road from Cripple Creek to the Rutherford Co. line on the east fork, Apr 3, 1804 [RCM A, p. 15]. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809 and 1811, owning 265 acres. He settled at Readyville on land bought from Griffith Rutherford. He was on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co.

29. Thomas <u>Braughton/Broughton</u> b. Apr 18, 1760 in St. John's Parish on the Cooper River in SC - d. Feb 14, 1835 in Lawrence Co., AL. He m. in the summer 1783, Mary <u>Wallace</u>, b. ca 1764 - d. Apr 22, 1847in Gibson Co., TN. He served on the SC line during the Revolutionary War, having enlisted at St. John's Parish where he was living. His widow applied for benefits June 9, 1842 in Gibson Co., TN, age 78. Thomas <u>Braughton</u> was listed on the 1820 census of Rutherford Co. CHILDREN: Robert Wallace <u>Braughton</u> (b. 1784 - d. 1785); Ann Singleton <u>Braughton</u> (b. June 29, 1786); Sarah <u>Braughton</u> (b. & d. 1789); Thomas <u>Braughton</u> (b. Sep 8, 1791); Mary <u>Braughton</u> (b. May 9, 1794); Isabel Stewart <u>Braughton</u> (b. Mar 15, 1799); Ruth <u>Braughton</u> (b. May 14, 1802, m. Josiah <u>Penn</u>). [RWP]. Mary <u>Broughton</u> was listed head of the household on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co.

30. John Brown, Sen., b. Jan 25, 1761 in Lunenburg Co., VA - d. ca Feb 1849 (His original will exists in Rutherford Co. Archives dated June 3, 1846, probated Mar 1849). He applied for a pension Mar 11, 1833, stating his age was 72, and he had given service on the VA line during Revolutionary War. He was drafted for two 6-month terms for the Colony of VA. On May 3, 1836 he requested his pension be transferred to Rutherford Co., TN because his "children were living there." [RWP]. He m. 1st unknown; m. 2nd Sep 8, 1805 in Lunenburg Co., VA, Annie Wilson. Evidently, both wives died in VA before 1836. He was listed on the 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 80. CHILDREN: Grechson Brown ("was away and was to receive his share if he returned within 6 years"; Thomas Brown (b. 1787); Lucretia R. Brown (deceased before 1846, b. 1790, m. John Weatherford); John W. Brown, Jr. (b. Apr 25, 1797); Gerusha "Rusha" Brown (b. 1797, m. Sep 21, 1821, Thomas Pully); Margaret "Peggy" Brown (b. 1798, unm.); William R. Brown (b. 1803, m. Delila Weatherford, went to Texas ca 1855); Richard Brown (b. 1810, m. Elizabeth Thompson); Nancy Brown; Marthenia Brown (may have been handicapped)..

31. George <u>Bruce</u>, b. ca 1745 - d. after 1840. He drew Revolutionary War pension in 1818 Rutherford Co. list, age 73. He was b. 1750-60 on the 1830 census. He was listed on 1840 census of Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner for service in NC troops, age 81, living with Joseph <u>Arthur</u>. National Archives records his pension papers (S 39212). No wife or children were mentioned.

32. William <u>Bruce</u>, b. ca 1760 - d. after 1840, drew pension in 1832 Rutherford Co. list, age 72, for service on VA Revolutionary line. John <u>Bruce</u>, age 45, appeared on 1840 Rutherford Co. census for William <u>Bruce</u>, a Revolutionary War pensioner. William <u>Bruce</u> was Capt. of Volunteers at "New Store" in July 1781 on the VA line. DAR records state he died in Sumner Co., TN.

33. Major John Buchanan, Jr., a Revolutionary War veteran, b. Jan 14, 1759 at Harrisburg, PA - d. Nov 6, 1832, at Buchanan Station on Mill Creek, Davidson Co., TN (now Elm Hill Pike). He was the son of John Buchanan, Sen., and Jane Trindle. He m. 1st in 1786, Margaret Kennedy and m. 2nd Oct 15, 1791, Sarah "Sallie" Ridley, b. Nov 28, 1773 in Watauga Settlement, TN territory - d. Nov 29, 1835 Mill Creek, Davidson Co., daughter of Captain George Ridley and Elizabeth "Betsey" Weatherford. Sallie was called "first lady of the frontier" by eastern papers throughout her life. She is possibly the first female born in TN territory. As a young girl she lived at Ridley Station, 2 miles from Buchanan Station. She was said to be "large, tough, rough, kind, crude, gentle." As assignee of Col. Martin Armstrong, Major John Buchanan, Jr. was granted 200 acres on the west side of Stones River about 4 miles above the old station, Dec 1, 1788, NC Grant No. 41 [RCHS Pub. Land Grants]. In 1803 he and Moses Ridley petitioned the State of TN to build a mill dam on the Stone's River about 10 miles downstream from Jefferson. The State allowed the construction, but required that the builders install navigation locks in order for boats to travel the river. The site was later known as Jones' Mill approximately 28 miles from the mouth of the river. [RCHS Pub # 18, p. 113]. Major John Buchanan, Jr. was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809, owning 4,605 acres. On the 1811 Rutherford Co. tax list he owned 4745 acres. A surveyor, his book "Mathematics," was the first book published in TN and is on display at the TN State Museum along with his portrait. CHILD of Major John and Margaret: John S. Buchanan, III, (b. May 15, 1787, m. 1805 in Davidson Co., Margaret Sample). CHILDREN of Major John and Sallie: George <u>Buchanan</u> (b. Oct 11, 1792); Alexander "Alex" <u>Buchanan</u> (b. Mar 22, 1794); Elizabeth "Betsy" Buchanan (b. Dec 29, 1795, m. Thomas Hardeman "Tom" Everett); Samuel Buchanan (b. Aug 27, 1797); William Buchanan (b. Jan 12, 1800); Jane Trindle Buchanan (b. Mar 23, 1802, m. George Goodwin); James Bryant Buchanan (b. Mar 10, 1804); Moses Ridley Buchanan (b. Apr 4, 1806); Sarah Vincent "Sally" Buchanan (b. Dec 31, 1807, m. 1824 Davidson Co., James B. Williams); Charles Bingley Buchanan (b. Oct 28, 1809, d. ca May 1836 testate leaving his estate to his siblings); Richard Gregory "Dick" Buchanan (b. Nov 3, 1811); Senator Henry Ridley Buchanan (b. Nov 8, 1814); Nancy Mulherrin Buchanan (b. July 31, 1818); Clorabeth Buchanan (her brother, Charles, states she is his elder sister & m. Thomas H. Everett). [Buchanan Family records].

34. John <u>Bullard</u>, b. ca 1753 - d. after 1832. He applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. Aug 21, 1832 for service in VA Revolutionary line, stating his age 79. He was born in PA but as a boy moved to Prince William Co., VA where he enlisted at age 19. [RWP]. His service records state he served in the 10th Regt. of the VA Continental Line from Caroline Co., VA 1777-1778. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809. He appeared on a list of letters remaining at the post office in Jefferson Jan 1, 1810 and Aug 10, 1810. He witnessed the will of George <u>Goodman</u> of Rutherford Co. Nov 5, 1814. He was listed on the 1820 & 1830 census of Rutherford Co.

35. Samuel <u>Burk/Burke</u>, b. ca 1763 - d. after 1832. He drew pension in 1832 Rutherford Co. list, age 69, for service on NC Revolutionary line. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax lists for 1809 & 1811, and on the 1810 census of Rutherford Co. DAR state his name was Samuel <u>Burke</u>, b. 24 July 1764 in Prince Edward Co., VA, d. before Sep 1840 in Madison Co., MO. DAR records name 2 sons: William <u>Burke</u> and Willis <u>Burke</u>.

36. David Burleson. Sen., also Burlason/Burlison, b. in Lunenburg Co., Va. 1755 - d. Aug 13, 1832. He took the Oath of Allegiance May 28, 1778 in Anson Co., NC, and served in James Farris' Bn. Wade s NC Regt. Revolutionary War, discharged 9 Oct 1782. He m. 1774 in Anson Co., NC, Ursula Weatherford, b. 1758 Montgomery Co., NC - d. before 1835 in Rutherford Co. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. 1810 census and on the 1809 & 1811 tax lists. He wrote his will dated 28 Feb 1828, probated Aug 1832, with Ursula Burlason, widow. CHILDREN: John Washington Burleson, (b. Sep 3, 1775); Moses Burleson, (b. 1776/1777, moved to Jefferson Co., AL); Sarah Burleson (b. 1778, m. (1) Sherwood Rowland); Mary Burleson, (b. 1780, m. Thomas Brooks); David Burleson, Jr., (b, 1781-1783); William Burleson, (b. 1785, d. Lawrence Co., TN); Margaret /Peggy Burleson, (b. 1787, m. 1810, Ezekiel Pope); Eleanor/ Nelly Burleson, (b. Jan 1, 1789, m. William T. Rowland); Hill K. Burleson, (b. 1790, m. Penelope Pope); Ursula Burleson, (b. 1792, m. Oct 1, 1816, Nathan/Nathaniel Self [Ursula may also have m. Apr 5, 1821, Thomas Brashear per the Rutherford Co. Marriage records]); Isaac Burleson, (b. m. (1) Fanny Morton and m. (2) Julia B. Holloway). [Burleson//Burlason Cemetery, Burleson Lane, Smyrna area].

37. William <u>Burnet/Burnett, Sen.</u>, [he signed his last name <u>Burnitt</u>) b. in Va. ca 1759 - d. 1845, (OCC). In his declaration for Rev. War pension he stated in Aug 1832 that he was 73 years old and born in King & Queen Co., VA; he was living and first enlisted in Mecklenburg Co., VA; his service was as private; he moved to and has lived in Rutherford Co., TN about 30 years. He owned 100 acres on the 1809 Rutherford Co. tax list and 127 acres on the 1811 tax list. He was listed on the 1810, 1820, & 1830 census of Rutherford Co. He was listed age 91 on the 1840 Rutherford Co. Rev. War pensioner's census. His original will exists in Rutherford Co. Archives dated 25 May 1840, probated Aug 1845. He names his wife, Litty <u>Burnett</u> and executor: R. H. [Reynear H.] <u>Mason</u>. CHILDREN: Brooking J. <u>Burnett</u>; William <u>Burnett [Jr.]</u>; John <u>Burnett</u>; Jane <u>Burnett</u> (deceased, m.? <u>Whoberry</u>; Achilles J. <u>Burnett</u>; Lewis G. <u>Burnett</u>; Henry <u>Burnett</u> (deceased). The children of his deceased daughter, Jane, were: Jacob <u>Whoberry</u>; Martha Whoberry White; Jeffrey Whoberry; Fines Whoberry.

38. Col. Joseph Burrus, b. in Amherst Co., Va. July 26, 1762 - d. Jan 14, 1821, emigrated to Tenn in 1807. His parents were said to be Charles & Sarah Woolfolk Burrus. He m. Sophia Rucker, b. in Amherst Co., Va. July 7, 1775 - d. Feb 26, 1835 (Burrus Cemetery, off Lebanon Road). He served as Pvt in VA Revolutionary troops. [DAR records]. He was overseer of the road from John Sullins's Creek to Thomas Rucker's, Jul 11, 1814 [RCM G, p. 194]. He wrote his will Jan 13, 1819, probated Mar 1821. He owned 1,550 acres on the 1809 & 1811 tax lists and was listed on the 1810 & 1820 census. Sophia Burrus b. 1780-90 was listed as head of the household on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. CHILDREN: Elizabeth Burrus, (b. 5 Mar 1802, m. Samuel Anderson); DeLafayette "Fayette" Burrus, (b. 21 Nov 1797); Sarah Woolfolk Burrus, (d. 14 May 1833 in Giles Co., TN, m. 1826, Aaron V. Brown, later Governor of TN he later m. her sister); Lucy Ann Burrus, (d. Jan 1825); Charles Burrus; James Rucker Burrus [some say the oldest son] moved to Mississippi; Capt. William C. J. Burrus, a prominent politician; Philip Johnson Burrus, (b. 26 Feb 1807 - d. 23 July 1857, m. 20 June 1827, Martha W. Yandell, daughter of Dr. Wilson Yandell). The estate was to receive slaves from the estate of Pamelia Burrus, deceased, of Alabama.

39. John <u>Burton</u> b. 1761 in Mecklenburg Co., NC - d. Jan 30, 1839 in Sangamon Co., IL. He applied for pension Sep 2, 1833 in Sangamon Co., IL for service as Pvt. & Sgt. in the 5th & 9th VA Regt. in the Revolutionary War. In 1807 he moved to Rutherford Co., and in 1827 he moved to Sangamon Co., IL to be near his children. [RWP]. He was on the 1810 & 1820 census of Rutherford Co.

- 40. William <u>Byers</u> b. Apr 6, 1747 in York Co., PA d. after Oct 1832. He m. (wife not named) prior to 1772. He applied for pension Oct 12, 1832 in Williamson Co., TN for service on the SC line in the Revolutionary War. He stated that in 1765 he moved with his father to York District, SC where he enlisted. In 1816 he moved to Williamson Co., TN. [RWP]. He may have lived near the Williamson and Rutherford Co. lines. He was on the 1811 Rutherford Co. tax list and on the 1820 census of Rutherford Co.
- 41. John <u>Bynum</u>, b. ca 1757 in Orange Co., NC d. after 1840. He applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. Aug 20, 1832, age 77, for service on the GA Revolutionary line. He stated that when he enlisted he was living in Wilkes Co., GA. After his service he moved to Chatham Co., NC, then SC, then to TN. He was listed on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. and listed on the 1840 Cannon Co., TN Rev. War pensioner's census, age 83. His widow, Betty Sear Bynum received pension after his death.
- 42. William Cain/Kain, b. Nov 1751 in Lunenburg Co., VA d. 22 Oct 1828. He applied for a pension in 1818 in Rutherford Co., stating he had enlisted in Sussex Co., VA in 1775 for service on the VA continental line in the Revolutionary War. He was listed on the 1810 census for Rutherford Co. as William Kain.
- 43. Minos <u>Cannon, Sen.</u>, d. Jan 11, 1832 in Williamson Co., m. 1780 Letitia <u>Thompson</u>, b. Aug 29, 1753 Guilford Co., NC. Her parents (who m. May 12, 1750 in Amelia Co., VA) were Robert <u>Thompson</u> and Ann <u>Ferguson</u>. Robert <u>Thompson</u> was killed at the Battle of Alamance. Rev. War service records state that Minos <u>Cannon</u> served in Patterson's Bttn. "Flying Camp" in the DE troops. Minos and Letitia came to the Cumberland settlements soon after the Revolutionary War, but returned to NC soon after. They returned in 1790 to Middle TN. CHILDREN: Newton <u>Cannon</u>, b. 1781; Robert <u>Cannon</u>, b. 1790; Clement <u>Cannon</u>; Minos <u>Cannon</u>, Jr.; Thomas <u>Cannon</u>; Fanny <u>Cannon</u> (m.? <u>Cheatham</u>); Letcy <u>Cannon</u> (b. 1793, m. Dr. Abraham B. Morton, both buried Cannon Cemetery, city limits of Shelbyville, Bedford Co., TN). They lived in an area which was once Rutherford Co. but later became Williamson Co. near Triune.

44. Andrew Carnahan, b. July 11, 1762 in Baltimore Co., Maryland - d. May 4, 1839 (Carnahan Cemetery, Readyville area) [an original will exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives dated 23 Oct 1835, probated May 1839], son of Hugh Carnahan of Guilford Co., NC. He m. 1st Jan 9, 1783, Margaret Elizabeth Billingsley [called Elizabeth], who d. between 1795-1808. He m. 2nd Feb 7, 1808 in Williamson Co., TN, Sarah "Sally" Helton/Hilton, b. Nov 6, 1782, who as a widow age 70, applied for a Rev. War pension Mar 19, 1853. Andrew Carnahan applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. Sep 6, 1832, age 72, for service in NC Revolutionary line. He stated he was living in Guilford Co., NC at the time of his enlistment. His 1832 pension application records for Revolutionary Service contain the original pages from the family Bible [Andrew Carnahan and Elizabeth his wife was married in the year of our Lord 1783 in jenenary the 9. Hugh Carnahan was born in 1784 Aprile the 6. James Carnahan was born December 18, 1786. John [Franklin] Carnahan was bor in march the 18, 1788. Thomas Carnahan was born in August the 18 1790. Ann Carnahan was born in October the 3, 1792. Mary "Polly" Carnahan was born jenenary the 3, 1795 (m. William H. Youree). Andrew Carnahan and Sarah his wife was married February the 7, 1808. Sarah Hilton born November th 6 1782. Andrew Carnahan departed this life may the 4th 1839 age 76 year, 11 months, 16 days]. He arrived in Davidson Co. about 1785 and resided for 8 years, then went to Logan Co., KY for about 10 years and then returned to Rutherford Co., TN ca. 1803. He bought land in the Kittrell community in 1810 [RCHS Pub. #2, p. 46]. His property was located on Cripple Creek somewhere between present day Compton and Lascassas. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809, owning 500 acres, and on the 1810, 1820 & 1830 census. Sarah [Helton] Carnahan, widow of Andrew, d. before Oct 1859 with William Helton, administrator.

45. Andrew Castleman, b. Aug 22, 1764 in VA - d. Aug 11, 1844 near Nashville, son of Benjamin Castleman (killed 1784). He m. Apr 12,1787 at Old Fort Nashville, Margaret Ewing, b. ca 1770 - d. 1863. He was a scout during the time of the Revolutionary War. His brothers were Abraham Castleman; Jacob Castleman (killed in the Indian Wars); Joseph Castleman (killed in the Indian Wars); and Hans Castleman (badly wounded In the Indian Wars). They waged a deadly warfare against the Creek Indian Nation in TN between 1780-1793. Andrew Castleman was badly wounded [DAR records]. Andrew Cassellman was appointed guardian of Joseph Cassellman, son of Jacob Cassellman, Jr., deceased [Apr 1803, Davidson Co. Minutes]. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809 owning 105 acres. CHILDREN: Phoebe Castleman (b. Aug 5, 1788); Susannah Castleman (b. June 15, 1790); Amelia Castleman (b. Dec 2, 1792); Jacob Castleman (b. Jan 4, 1795); Sarah/Sallie Castleman (b. Oct 26, 1796); Nathan Castleman (b. Oct 13, 1798); Lina Phipps Castleman (b. Oct 6, 1800); Elizabeth/Betsy Castleman (b. Aug 27, 1802); Cynthia Ewing Castleman (b. Nov 22, 1804, m. Richard Beard); Andrew Ewing Castleman (b. Sep 12, 1806, m. Nancy Redding); Robert Bell Castleman (b. Dec 9, 1808); Martha/Patsy Castleman (b. Dec 17, 1810, m. William Nance); Mary/Polly Castleman (b. Mar 19, 1813, m. ? Foster).

46. Jacob <u>Caulk</u>, <u>Sen.</u>,b. ca 1755 - d. after 1839. He applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. May 6, 1818 stating he had enlisted in the Revolutionary War in Middleton, Delaware and served on the Delaware line. In 1820 he was listed as age 65 with a wife. CHILDREN: Jacob <u>Caulk</u>, <u>Jr.</u> (age 18); William <u>Caulk</u> (age 12); Margaret <u>Caulk</u> (age 25); Martha <u>Caulk</u> (age 23); Elizabeth <u>Caulk</u> (age 15); and a grandson, John <u>Guess</u> (age 3). He was listed on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. In 1839 he was a resident of Madison Co., AL. There were 2 individuals of that name listed on the 1820 census for Rutherford Co. born prior to 1775.

47. Abner <u>Chappell</u> appeared on a list of letters remaining at the post office in Jefferson on Apr 1, 1811 and July 16, 1811. He was b. 13 Apr 1763 in Amelia Co., VA, moved to what became Bedford Co., TN ca 1807 and on 4 Feb 1833 was living in Howard Co., MO where he applied for a Revolutionary War pension for service as Pvt. in Capt. Pleasant's company in the Gen. Steuben's brigade on the VA line.

48. John Charlton, Sen,, b. Apr 12, 1761in Cumberland Co., VA - d. May 19, 1839 in Davidson Co. He was a private in Col. Beverly Randolph's VA Regt. in the Revolutionary War. He applied for a pension in Davidson Co., TN Apr 18, 1833. His wife, Ann Charlton, b. Mar 4, 1763 - d. May 19, 1839 is buried near Nashville. [RWP]. His son was Dr. George Washington Charlton,.

49. John Childress, was b. May 5, 1755 in Cumberland Co., VA - d. Jan 9, 1844. He applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. Nov 22, 1832, for service in the Revolutionary War. His father (not named) was killed at Braddock's Defeat. He enlisted in Surry Co., NC where he had moved in 1779. Then moved to Fayette Co., KY where he enlisted in Dec 1781. After the War he moved to Red River in TN, then to Mansker's Station about 10-12 miles above Nashville for 2 years, then to Laurens Co., SC for 18 years, then to Sevier Co., TN and in 1826 moved to Rutherford Co. He m. in Laurens Co., SC, Martha Calhoon, daughter of Thomas Calhoon. [RWP]. He purchased 914 acres of land lying on Stuarts [Stewarts] Creek, Dec 8, 1801. He was on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. with a female in the household b. 1740-1750.

50. John Chrisp/Crisp, b. Dec 23, 1755 in Prince George Co., VA - d. after 1840. He drew pension in 1832 Rutherford Co. for service in the Revolutionary War. He stated that as a child he moved to Chesterfield Co., VA and in 1784 he moved to Cumberland Co., VA. In Nov 1817 he moved to Rutherford Co., TN. He moved to Gibson Co., TN in Oct 1832 and

reapplied for Revolutionary War pension Dec 1833, stating his age 78. On the 1840 pensioners census, he drew pension in Gibson Co. living with William Crisp, for service on VA Revolutionary line.

60. Anthony <u>Clark Sen.</u> b. 21 June 1739 in Ireland - d. 14 July 1827 "on Long Creek, Rutherford Co." buried Clark Cemetery, Bedford Co., TN, a Rev. War patriot, m. 1st 3 Nov 1774, Mary <u>Oats</u> b. 4 Nov 1749 in Ireland - d. 14 June 1797; m. 2nd Susannah. He settled in Rutherford Co. in an area that later became Bedford Co. His original will exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives dated 30 June 1826. CHILDREN of Anthony & 1st wife, Mary: Mary <u>Clark</u> (m. James <u>Glenn</u> of Marshall Co., TN); John <u>Clark</u> (of Rutherford Co. m. Mary <u>McFarland</u>); Robert <u>Clark</u> (m. Mary <u>Harris</u>); James <u>Clark</u> (m. Virginia <u>Bingham</u>); Susan Elizabeth <u>Clark</u> (m. William <u>McClure</u>); Anthony <u>Clark Jr.</u> (m. Sarah <u>Dunlap</u>); Margaret <u>Clark</u> (m. Robert <u>Bingham</u>); Fannie <u>Clark</u> (never married). CHILDREN of Anthony <u>Clark</u> & 2nd wife, Susannah: William <u>Clark</u> (m. Emily <u>Kelton</u>); Walter <u>Clark</u> (m. 61. John Clark[e] or C. John Clark. b. Nov 1761 in Lancaster Co., SC - d. bet. 1840-Oct 1842. He m. Elinor Harding, d. 1843. He applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. Nov 21, 1832, for service in the NC Revolutionary line. He enlisted in Lancaster Co., SC and served part of the time as a substitute for his father, William Clark. He moved to Rutherford Co. in 1806. [RWP]. He was on the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809 and 1811, owning 150 acres. He was b. 1750-1760 on the 1810, 1820 & 1830 census of Rutherford Co. He was listed in 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 80. He received a Rutherford Co. Militia Commission with rank of Lieut. on Apr 29, 1812. A road was to be built from the Williamson Co. line to intersect the new road from Columbia between John Clark's and William Lamb's; intersect the road from Murfreesboro to Shelbyville at Hamilton's, 1814 [RCM - G-221]. He was an early settler in the Versailles Community of Rutherford Co. His estate was administered by Richard Nance. Widow: Elenor Clark. His daughter, Elizabeth C. Clark, b. 1805, m. Richard Jackson, son of Francis Marion Jackson, Sen. and Elizabeth W. Childress of the Versailles area.[V, p. 16].

62. John W. <u>Clay</u>, b. in Dinwiddie Co., Va. 1755 - d. in Rutherford Co. 11/12 May1835, m. ca 1779-1780 in Dinwiddie Co., VA, Millerson <u>Epps</u>. He drew pension in 1832 Rutherford Co. list, age 79, for service on VA Revolutionary line in the Dinwiddie Co. militia in Aug 1777 and served several terms throughout the war. The application for widow's benefits under the Act of 1836 by Millison <u>Clay</u>, age 86 or 87 years, widow of John <u>Clay</u> filed 24 July 1837, was rejected because she did not have proof of marriage. He was listed on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co.

63. William Cocke, Sen., b. ca 1759 in Hanover Co, VA - d. ca Feb 1835. He m. 1791 Rebecca Farris. At the time of his death he was married to Martha ? . William Cock produced a license to practice as an attorney to the [Davidson Co.] Court, May 1789 [Fulcher]. He petitioned for a pension in Rutherford Co. Aug 24, 1832, age 72, stating that he entered service in the Revolutionary War Sep 10, 1779 in Bedford Co., VA, where he was living, serving on the VA line and was at the Battle of Yorktown. Service records show he was a Sgt. in the 11th & 15th VA Regt. [RWP]. He was listed on the 1810, 1820, & 1830 census of Rutherford Co. His will was dated Jan 11, 1835 and probated Feb 1835 [the original exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives]. CHILDREN: Sarah Cocke (m. William C. Vaulx); Lucy Cocke; Mary Cocke (m. 1818, Caleb McGraw); Anthony Cocke; Nancy Cocke (will dated 1 Jul 1842, probated Sep 1842, names sisters and parents); Bradley Cocke'; John Cocke; Lancelot Cocke; William Green Cocke; Agness Cocke; Edmund Cocke (executor); Martha Cocke (m. ? Clay - may be Green Clay); Elizabeth G. Cocke (m. William A. Hill).

- 64. John <u>Curlee</u>, b. in N.C. 1761 d. in Rutherford Co. Apr 1, 1812, m. 1781 in Anson Co., NC, Mary <u>Barber</u>, b.1767 d. 1829. He served as a Private on the NC Continental line as a Rev. war soldier, and received a land grant for his service. [DAR records]. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809 and 1811. CHILDREN: Elizabeth <u>Curlee</u> (m. ? <u>Eulce</u>); Rhoda Tabitha <u>Curlee</u>, (m. David B. <u>Arnett</u>); Cullen <u>Curlee</u>, (b. 1776); Calvin <u>Curlee</u>; Ann <u>Curlee</u> (m. 1st Noah <u>Smith</u> and m. 2nd Burton <u>Smith</u>).
- 65. Cornelius <u>Dabney</u> served in General <u>Nelson</u>'s Corps of VA Light Dragoons in the Revolutionary War. He was b. before 1766 in the 1810 Rutherford Co. census. He reported finding a bay mare on the west fork of the Stones River May 21, 1811
- 66. Josiah <u>Davidson</u> b. 1766 d. after 1851. He applied for pension July 24, 1851 in Hickman Co., TN for service on the NC line in the Revolutionary War, age 85. He lived in Orange Co., NC when he enlisted, and after the War he moved to TN. He was in Rutherford Co. when he purchased items at the estate sale of John <u>Miller</u>, deceased, Oct 23, 1806. He was listed as b. before 1766 on the 1810 census of Rutherford Co. and was on the tax list for 1809, owning 93 acres. Josiah <u>Davidson</u> [he was also referred to as Josiah <u>Davis</u>] was appointed overseer on the road leading from the forks of the Stones River at Stewart's Creek to the Davidson Co. line, Apr 3, 1804 [RCM A, p. 16].
- 67. Richard <u>Dean</u>, b. ca 1757 d. 28 July 1831 (will dated July 16, 1831, probated 15 Aug 1831). He applied Aug 14, 1818 for pension in 1818 Rutherford Co. for service in the Revolutionary War on the NC line. In 1820 he was listed as 63 with no family. [RWP]. He wrote his will July 16, 1831 [the original exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives] which was recorded Dec 21, 1831, naming as heirs of his estate, the following individuals: Benjamin <u>Flowers</u>; Cornelius <u>Sanders</u>; Abraham <u>Baten</u>; Margarett <u>Sanders</u>; Demarris/Demarnis <u>Sanders</u>; John M. <u>Sanders</u>; James <u>Sanders</u>; Elender <u>Sanders</u>; Elender J. <u>Sanders</u>.
- 68. General Joseph Dickson, Sen., b. in Chester Co., Pa. April 1745 - d. Apr 1825; wrote his will 8 Oct 1823, and probated 19 Apr 1825 in Rutherford Co. He m. 1763, Margaret Isabella McEwen, b. 1741 in Scotland or Chester Co., PA - d. 10 Nov 1814 in Murfreesboro. They moved to Rutherford Co. in 1806. He served as Major at King s Mountain during Revolutionary War and by the end of the War was a Brigadier General. He sat in the NC convention which ratified the United States Constitution in 1789 and was a commissioner who helped to establish the University of NC, 1788-1795. He was a U. S. Congressman for NC and served from Mar 1799 until Mar 1801. He and his wife lived near Murfree's Spring, 1811 [RCM - F-40]. He was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax lists for 1809 & 1811, owning 400 acres, and on the 1810 & 1820 census. He appeared on a list of letters remaining at the Jefferson Post Office Jan 1, 1810. He and his wife were listed as members who organized the Presbyterian Church in Murfreesboro in April 1812. CHILDREN: James Dickson, (b. 1766); Elizabeth/Eliza Dickson, (b. Nov 10, 1767, m. Jonathan Graves); Isabella Dickson, (b. Feb 25, 1769, m. Bennett Smith); John Dickson, (b. Mar 8, 1772, m. Margaret McKissack); Joseph Dickson, Jr., (b. Nov 5, 1773 (twin); Robert Dickson, (b. Nov 5, 1773 (twin); William Dickson, (b. Oct 3, 1775, m. Margaret McDowell); Margaret Dickson, (b. July 25,1779, m. Col. James Henderson); Ezekiel Dickson, (b. Feb 1, 1782).
- 69. Stephen <u>Duboise</u>, b. 1758 in Darlington Co., Cheraw Dist., SC d. after 1832. He applied Aug 24, 1832 in Rutherford Co. for pension for service on the SC line in the Revolutionary War. He enlisted at Man's Bluff on the Big Peedee River. [RWP].
- 70. Isaac <u>Eoff</u>, b. ca 1758-1761 in NJ "about 30 miles from NY" d. Oct 2, 1841 in Beech Grove, Coffee Co., TN. He moved at some point to Chester Co. S.C. and then to Madison Co. KY in the spring of 1788. In the

- spring of 1812 he moved to TN. Isaac and his uncle Abraham <u>Eoff</u> fought in the Revolutionary War. Isaac, at age 14, served in the army instead of his father, who had been drafted. He applied for a pension Aug 7, 1832 in Rutherford Co. for service in the Revolutionary War on the SC line. He was listed on the 1840 Cannon Co., TN Revolutionary War pensioner's census, age 79. He m. Mar 12, 1783 in Chester District, SC, Margaret "Peggy" <u>Knox</u>, b. 1763 in Chester District, SC d. Apr 26, 1848 in Carroll Co., AR. She applied for widow's benefits in Carroll Co., AR, age ca 86. CHILDREN: Margaret <u>Eoff</u> (b. 1785, m. ? <u>Kanady</u>); Jane Rebecca <u>Eoff</u> (b. 1786, m. ? <u>Knox</u>); Joseph <u>Eoff</u> (b. 1789); Catherine <u>Eoff</u> (b. 1791, m. ? <u>Buck</u>); John W. <u>Eoff</u> (b. Mar 15, 1795, m. Lucy <u>Shaw</u>); Samuel C. <u>Eoff</u> (b. 1799); William P. Albert <u>Eoff</u> (b. ca 1803, m. Isabelle <u>?</u>); Alexander <u>Eoff</u> (b. ca 1804, m. Susan <u>Anderson</u>).
- 71. John Etter, b. June 1760 in PA d. Feb 19, 1851 in Rutherford Co. He applied for a pension Nov 14, 1828 in Rutherford Co., for service in the Revolutionary War on the VA line, stating his age was 65. Service records state he was Private in the 1st Regt. of Light Dragoons in the VA Continental Troops. He had built a residence along Stewart's Creek about 1797. [RCHS Pub # 18, p. 108] [Etter Cemetery, Stewartsboro School area]. He was listed on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. John Ealter appeared on 1840 Rutherford Co. census as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 81. Some of the CHILDREN: Lucy J. Etter (m. John Walden); Elizabeth Etter (m. Eli Smith); Lydia J. Etter (m. Joshua Elder); Nancy Etter (m. Amos Boring); Dorothy Etter (m. John Pope).
- 72. Alexander Ewing b. ca 1762 in Mecklenberg Co., NC d. Apr 20, 1843 in Marshall Co., TN (formerly a part of Bedford Co.), m. 1791 in Mecklenberg Co., NC, Sarah Chappell, b. Aug 12, 1761 d. June 5, 1819. [Fulcher, p. 53]. He was a private in the Rev. War in the Co. commanded by Capt Osburn of the Regiment commanded by Major White in the NC line. He stated he had a brother, Robert Ewing. He was listed in the 1809 Rutherford Co. tax list, owning 1,000 acres.
- 73. David Faulkenberg/Faulkenberry/Fortenberry [Sen.], b. ca 1746-d. after 1840. He applied for pension Sep 6, 1832 in Rutherford Co. for service in SC line of the Revolutionary War, stating his age was 86. He stated he was living in Cashaw [Cheraws District?] Co., SC when he enlisted and lived there 18-20 years after the War. He then moved to Clarke Co., GA and in 1808 he moved to Rutherford Co. He was listed on the 1810 census for Rutherford Co. His son, Jacob Faulkenberry presented an affidavit with the application stating his age as 62 and living in Rutherford Co. in 1832. [RWP]. He was listed on the 1840 Cannon Co., TN Rev. War pensioner's census, age 101, living with William Pace,
- 74. Capt. Michael <u>Fisher</u> appeared on a list of letters remaining at the post office in Jefferson July 1, 1811. He was a Rev. War soldier, PA Militia, b. 20 May 1766, d. 18 Dec 1833 (buried Old Crowell Chapel Cemetery, Bedford Co., TN).
- 75. Samuel Fleming, Sen., b. Apr 1, 1755 in Rowan Co., NC "on the waters of the Yadkin River" d. Aug 23, 1832 in Rutherford Co. He m. Aug 5, 1774 in Bedford Co., VA, Elizabeth Rutherford, b. 1755-60 d. after 1840. He enlisted in the fall of 1775 as a private under Capt William Knox. He stated he often times served as a spy until 1780. He applied for pension Dec 6, 1828 in Rutherford Co. and again on Aug 23, 1832 in Rutherford Co. for service in the Revolutionary War on the NC line. He enlisted in Rowan Co., NC. [RWP]. He was listed in the 1809 & 1811 Rutherford Co. tax lists, and on the 1820 & 1830 census. CHILDREN: Elizabeth C. Fleming, (b. 1801, m. William G. Parrish); John Fleming; William Fleming.
- 76. Joshua <u>Ford, Sen.</u>, b. ca 1755-6 near Baltimore, MD d. 1844 in Rutherford Co. He m. 1788 in Edgefield District, SC, Nancy <u>Cox</u>. In his application for pension Oct 4, 1832 for service in the Revolutionary War in

Rutherford Co., he stated his age was ca 75 and he was a Private and Indian spy in Richmond Co., GA. His father moved the family to NC then to SC on the Savannah River in the Edgefield District for 1-2 years, then to Richmond Co., GA where he enlisted for service in the Revolutionary War. He moved to Edgefield District, SC when he m. and lived there until 1807 when he moved to KY and TN. He was listed on the 1820 & 1830 census for Rutherford Co. He appeared on the 1840 census for Rutherford Co. as a Revolutionary War pensioner, age 83. He d. before Apr 1844 when his widow, Rebecca, was named, and administrator, Andrew M. Ford. CHILDREN: Polly Ford (b. 1794, m. Isaac Johns); Tabitha Ford; Joshua Ford, Jr.. [DAR records].

77. Littleton Fuller b. July 10, 1761 in Granville Co., NC - d. ca 1841. He applied for pension Oct 11, 1832 in Tuscaloosa, AL for service on the NC line in the Revolutionary War. He enlisted in Granville Co., NC. After the War he moved to Edgefield Dist., SC for 11 years, then to "West TN", then to Tuscaloosa, AL ca 1817. On Mar 24, 1841, Ezekiel Fuller was administrator of the soldier's estate in Tuscaloosa, AL. He was listed on the 1810 census of Rutherford Co.. He received a Rutherford Co. Militia Commission with rank of Ensign "company of men not subject to militia duty" on Feb 7, 1814.

78. Samuel Gray b. Apr 22, 1752 in NC – d. 23 Mar 1837 in Lincoln Co., TN, m. Aug 19, 1773 in NC, Rachel ___?__. He entered service in the Rev. War in Wilkes Co., NC and was attached to Capt. Joseph Herndon's Co. of Rangers or Spies guarding the frontier settlement of Wilkes and Burke Counties on the Yadkin River. He applied for pension Nov 6, 1832 in Bedford Co., TN for service in the NC line of the Revolutionary War. He was living in Wilkes Co., NC when he enlisted. His widow applied for benefits Oct 6, 1845 in Lincoln Co., TN, age 86. Samuel's brother, John Gray, was living in Franklin Co., TN in 1832. Samuel Gray was listed in the Rutherford Co. tax list for 1809, and the 1820 census for Rutherford Co. CHILDREN: Mary/Polly Gray, (b. Sep 19, 1774, m. Aug 19, 1802 in Davidson Co., William Dickson "member of Congress" - "daughter of Maj. Gray"); Margery Gray, (b. Dec 12, 1776); Elizabeth Gray, (b. Dec 24, 1779); Frances Gray, (b. Sep 5, 1782); Austin Gray, (b. Feb 10, 1788); Salley Gray, (b. Mar 13, 1791); Martin Gray, (b. Jan 6, 1795).

79. Lewis <u>Grigg/Griggs</u>, b. 1758 in Dinwiddie Co., VA - d. ca 1835. He applied for pension Aug 23, 1832 in Rutherford Co. for service in the Revolutionary War on the VA line, stating his age 75. He was living at Greenville [Greene?] Co., VA at enlistment. Service records show he was a Private in the VA troops. [RWP]. VA Revolutionary War records indicate he applied for "Bounty Land", having served as a Pvt. He wrote his will [the original exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives] Jan 19, 1835, probated 7 Nov 1836 naming his wife, Susannah <u>Grigg</u> and CHILDREN: Lewis M. <u>Grigg</u>; Martha J. M. <u>Grigg</u> (m. ? <u>Davis</u>); Sally <u>Grigg</u> (m. ? <u>Ridout</u>).

80. John Hall age 92 (b. 1758 VA), was living with John Landrum (a Baptist clergyman) and Delphia Landrum (b. 1798 VA). He was a Rev. War veteran and applied for pension in 1835 stating he was born 1748 in King & Queen Co., VA and then moved with his father to Mecklenburg Co., VA. He moved to Rutherford Co., TN in 1817 and then moved to Williamson Co., TN. He stated that he is "known by John R. Percy, Thomas Pennington, John Gant, & John Landrum, a clergyman. John Hall, Sen wrote his will dated 4 Jan 1850, probated Jan 1853. Executors: Anderson Hall & John Landrum. of John Hall, and wife, Catharine."

81. Colonel Hance or Hans Hamilton, was b. in Hillsborough, N.C. Sep 15, 1763 - d. in Florence, Rutherford Co. Mar 31, 1816 (some sources state he is buried in the McNairy vault at the Nashville Old City Cemetery), son of Capt. Thomas Hamilton, Sen. (a Rev. War soldier on the VA line, d. 4 Apr 1829) and Jane McCracken, both of Scotland. Hance Hamilton m. Sep 27, 1787 in Guilford Co., NC, Mary Boyd McNairy, b. July 15,1764 in Guilford Co., NC - d. Oct 16, 1850 [her original will exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives], daughter of Francis McNairy of Scotland and Mary Boyd, and sister of Judge John McNairy of Nashville. Capt. Hance was a Revolutionary War pvt. and sgt. with the Guilford Co., NC troops. He was "of Guilford Co., NC" when he purchased from Thomas Hamilton [heir of Dr. Hance Hamilton see RCHS Pub. Land Grants] of Guilford Co., NC, 4,800 acres on both sides of the east fork of Stones River, May 18, 1795 (witnesses: Francis McNairy, Alexander McKeen, David Moore, Andrew McNairy) [RCHS Pub. Land Grants]. He owned 570 acres on the 1809 Rutherford Co. tax list, and 1,811 acres on the 1811 tax list, and was listed on the 1810 census. Hance Hamilton appeared on a list of letters remaining at the post office in Jefferson on Jan 1, 1810. A jury of view was required to view and mark out a road from Jefferson at Franklin Road entrance to Maj. Robert Purdy's land; Simon Miller's; Samuel Wilson's shoals; Abner John's; Richard Caswell's plantation; Samuel Campbell; John Flemming's land; Ben Smith's land; with the Nashville to Frederick Barfield road to Barfield's plantation; east crossing a branch below Hance Hamilton's fence; William Smith; to the Nashville to Duck River by Bennett Philips's; to William Hanly's, 1807 [RCM - C-34]. He was a Justice of the Peace performing marriages in 1812. Hans Hamilton was a commissioner for Rutherford Co. 13 Jan 1812. He represented Rutherford Co. in the 10th and 11th General Assemblies (1813-1816). Mary or Mare Hamilton/ Hambleton, b. 1770-1775, was listed as head of household on the 1820 & 1830 census for Rutherford Co. CHILDREN: Ann Hamilton, (b. Jan 15, 1789, m. James "Jimmy" Ridley); Mary Ann Hamilton, (b. Dec 7, 1795, m. David Thompson); Catherine "Kate" Hamilton, (b. Sep 26,1798, m. Robert Moore); Ladicia Hamilton, (b. Mar 1,1800, m. Alfred Moore); John Hamilton, (b. 1801 - a twin); Robert Hamilton, (b. 1801 - a twin); Andrew M. Hamilton, (b. Nov 10,1803, m. Mary Bryan); Louise Jane Hamilton, (b. Apr 4,1806, m. Jan 26, 1820, William Aymette); Minerva Tennessee Hamilton (b. Jan 13, 1813). (Hamilton family records).

82. Samuel Hand b. July 11, 1761 in NJ - d. June 19, 1840 in Warren Co., TN, m. 1st ?; m. 2nd 1792, Mary ?. He applied for pension Oct 6, 1832 in Warren Co., TN for service on the NC and SC line in the Revolutionary War. He stated he lived in Union Dist., SC when he enlisted. After 1781 he moved to Washington Co., TN for 3 years then back to York Dist., SC for 20 years. In ca 1794 he moved to Pulaski Co., KY for 4 years, then to Bedford Co., TN a few months and then to Rutherford Co. He later moved to Warren Co., TN. His widow, Mary, applied for benefits June 7, 1844 in Warren Co., TN, age 69. He was listed on the 1810 census of Rutherford Co. He received a Rutherford Co. Militia Commission with rank of Capt. on July 24, 1811. CHILDREN of first wife: Elkins Hand (b. Oct 12, 1785); Affee Hand (b. Mar 10, 1786); Temperance Hand (b. Feb 28, 1788). CHILDREN of second wife: James C. Hand (b. Mar 10, 1793); Elizabeth Hand (b. Sep 3, 1795); Jene Hand (b. Jan 18, 1798); William Bradford Hand (b. Jan 2, 1801); Asenath Hand (b. Mar 27, 1804); Harriet Hand (b. Dec 16, 1809); Nancy Hand (b. Oct 20, 1812). [RWP].

83. Sherwood <u>Harris</u> served as Sgt. in the Light Dragoons in the NC Troops during the Revolutionary War. He was b. before 1766 on the 1810 Rutherford Co. census. He was appointed overseer of a road from Black Fox's Camp to the Indian boundary; from Black Fox's Camp to where it intersects a road from Andrew <u>Oliver's</u>, Oct 7, 1806 [RCM - A, p. 204].

- 84. Gideon <u>Harrison</u>, b. 1762 in Augusta (now Rockingham) Co., VA [Presbyterian Church records show: "Gideon <u>Harrison</u> d. 11 Sep 1838 and Rhoda <u>Harrison</u>, d. 2 Apr 1838, an aged member] in Rutherford Co. Gideon <u>Harrison</u> m. 20 Sep 1827 in Rutherford Co., Rody <u>Harrison</u>. He applied for a pension in Rutherford Co. Aug 23, 1832 for service in the Revolutionary War on the NC line. He was living in Washington Co. in the Territory South of the Ohio (now in TN) at the time of enlistment. After service he lived some years in Alabama and moved to Rutherford Co. in 1827. [RWP]. He was listed on the 1830 census for Rutherford Co. One child known: Gideon Valsane <u>Harrison</u> (b. 1797, m. Zada <u>Wright</u>).
- 85. Joseph <u>Harrison</u>, age 65, on 22 Feb 1821 in Rutherford Co., TN filed a declaration for pension benefits for his service as private in the Rev. War. He enlisted 14 Apr 1777 in the 3^{rd} Maryland Regt. and was discharged 14 Apr 1780. He d. 1 Oct 1824.
- 86. Lt. William <u>Harrison</u>, b. ca 1750 d. 22 January or June 1833, drew pension on 1818 Rutherford Co. list, age 72, for service on NC Revolutionary line.
- 87. Joseph <u>Hasting/Hastings</u> appeared on a list of letters remaining at the post office in Jefferson on Jan 1, 1810 and Feb 15, 1811. Joseph <u>Hastings</u>, b. 25 Nov 1757, d. 30 Jan 1816, a Rev. War soldier, & probable wife, Susanah <u>Hastings</u>, 1755-1842, are buried in Hasting Campground Cemetery or New Hope Church Cemetery, Bedford Co., TN. Their probable children are also buried here.
- 88. John <u>Hedgforth</u>, b. ca 1760 d. after 1832, drew pension on 1832 Rutherford Co. list, age 72, for service on NC Revolutionary militia. He was listed as born before 1775 and head of a household on the 1820 census for Rutherford Co.

- 89. John <u>Hedgpeth</u> made gift deeds to (probably his CHILDREN) Aseneth <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Edney <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Elizabeth <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Nancy <u>Hedgpeth</u>; and, Silas <u>Hedgpeth</u> on 23 Nov 1817 [see DB L, p. 90]. John <u>Hedgpeth</u>, age 70, filed on 20 Aug 1832 an application for benefits for service in the Rev. War. He volunteered in June 1780 in Wayne Co., NC serving under Col. Richard <u>Caswell</u>. He has lived in Rutherford Co. 22 years. He wrote his will [the original exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives] July 20, 1830, probated Aug 1835. Widow: Lucy <u>Hedgpeth</u>. CHILDREN: Silas <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Jeremiah <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Milley <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Sarah <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Nancy <u>Hedgpeth</u> (m. 1822, John <u>McPeak, Jr.</u>); Aseneth <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Major <u>Hedgpeth</u>; Elizabeth <u>Hedgpeth</u> (m. 1823 Charles <u>Mackey</u>).
- 90. Samuel Henderson, Sen., b. in (?Hanover Co., VA and moved to Granville Co., NC?) 1737, moved to Laurens Co., S.C. prior to Rev. Ward. in Rutherford Co. ca Fall 1820, leaving a will [the original exists in the Rutherford Co. Archives] written 16 May 1818 (proved Dec term 1820). He m. in 1757, Mary Ann Waldrup, b. 1738 d. 1821 in Bartow Co., GA. They came to Rutherford Co., TN about 1803. He served as Lieut. 2nd Co., 2nd Regt. under Col. Francis Marion in the Revolutionary War. He also was named a Patriot for furnishing provisions in Laurens Co., SC. He was on the 1810 census of Rutherford Co. and owned 244 acres on the 1809 & 1811 tax lists. CHILDREN: Samuel Henderson, Jr., (m. Sally); Richard Henderson; James Henderson, (b. 1785, m. a cousin, Fannie Henderson); Mary Henderson, (m. Robert N. McNeese); Nancy Henderson, (m. William Rodgers), Patience Henderson, (m.
